# Venn Diagram



This strategy allows students to graphically display the **similarities** and **differences** between two items or themes. It works very well with groups allowing oral processing of learning. A very effective strategy for comparing and contrasting.

- Ideally students work in groups of 3 to 4.
- Students are given paper and markers.
- Ask the students to draw two large partially overlapping circles.
- Students are presented with information and asked to categorise it using similarities and differences.

## **Tips**

- This activity could be used with a variety of information and content across many
- Move around each group to ensure they are on task.
- The completed Venn Diagrams could be posted on the wall for all students to see and evaluate.
- Peer feedback could be introduced where groups give feedback on each other's Venn Diagrams.
- Three circles could be used to increase the complexity of the activity.
- The students could be invited to take a photo of the Venn Diagrams to support homework and revision.
- Alternatively the whole class' response could be collected by all students placing post-its on one large Venn Diagram.
